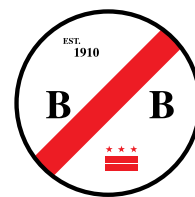

Washington in the Late Nineteenth Century



Setting the Scene

In the closing years of the eighteenth century, Washington, D.C. was a city in turmoil, bustling with political and social activity, and permeated with the prevailing segregated atmosphere brought about by the aftermath of the American Civil War (1861-1865). Numerous beneficial and relief organizations were established by the government to aid and benefit the District's approximate 310,000 citizens. The black population averaged about 90,000 and was particularly affected during this period of reconstruction because of the Southern program of discrimination and disfranchisement. Moreover, the remnants of the institution of slavery served to deteriorate the black family fabric and greatly limit most opportunities for advancement. A proliferation of clubs and societies began, especially in New York and Washington, D.C., that excluded one group or another within the black communities. Some residents viewed this as an unhealthy development that contributed to divisiveness at a time when discrimination against blacks required as much unity in their ranks as possible. In spite of such obstacles based on race or class, however, many of these people dedicated themselves to educational achievements, family reconstruction and creating an atmosphere of social awareness. Aristocrats of color emerged that included many surnames that are recognizable today, such as Du Bois, Bruce, Langston, Terrell and Woodson. Subsequently, in the late 1880s and 1890s, three prestigious gentlemen's organizations were established in Washington. These were the Manhattan, Acanthus and Cosmos clubs. The Manhattans, organized in 1888, limited its membership to 300. It was headquartered in a ten-room, three-story brick house and was dominated by men of high social standing. The Acanthus Club, with 115 members, had a clubhouse on L Street, located near the homes of several United States senators, and included a library, double parlors and a spacious dining room. In 1899, a number of colored Washingtonians, led by educator Francis L. Cardozo, Jr., formed the Cosmos Club for "the enjoyment of themselves and their friends." This club, patterned after a white group of the same name, sponsored four, annual invitation-only "Assemblies." Renamed the Monacan Club shortly after the turn of the twentieth century, the number of events was increased to six each year, yet this coterie remained the retreat of colored aristocrats. The time was right to form an organization in Washington, D.C. that would bring men from different backgrounds into brotherhood without regard to societal classifications or standing in the community.

The Founders

In 1910, the Bachelor's Pleasure Club, the roots of today's Bachelor-Benedict Club, was established by five enterprising African American men in Washington, D.C. They were Bismark R. Pinchback, Dr. Arthur Curtis, Frederick D. Wilkerson, John F. M. Wilkinson and Dr. William H. "Billy" Wilson. The following biographical information provides some insight into the lives of several of these founding fathers:

Bismark Robert Pinchback was born October 19, 1868, at Louisiana. He was the son of P. B. S. Pinchback (the only black to serve as Governor of Louisiana) and Nina Heathorn. Mr. Pinchback graduated from Southern University High School, in New Orleans, and later attended two sessions at the Medical Department, Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut. He then relocated to Washington, D.C. where he entered Howard University Medical College and earned his M.D. degree in 1891. Although medically trained, from 1897-1898, Mr. Pinchback was employed as a clerk with the New York State Comptroller's Office. He married about 1905 and, by 1910, was employed as a clerk with the Treasury Department and resided with his wife, Jeanetta, at 243 Florida Avenue, NW. Mr. Pinchback was the first president of Bachelor-Benedict. He died, without issue, on February 25, 1924 and is buried at National Harmony Memorial Park, Largo, Maryland.

Arthur Leo Curtis, born July 26, 1889, at Chicago, Illinois, was the son of Dr. Austin M. and Namahyoka Sockume Curtis. He probably arrived in Washington, D.C., about 1900. By June 6 of that year his father was Surgeon in Chief at Howard University Hospital. Dr. Curtis earned his M.D. degree from Howard University in 1912. His three siblings (Austin M., Jr.; Merrill Hargo and Gertrude E. C. Norris) also were physicians. Dr. Curtis maintained an in-home office at 1717 You Street, NW. About 1916, he married Helen Gordon, however, no children have been identified. Dr. Curtis registered for the draft on June 5, 1917, and later that year he attended Officers' Training School, Des Moines, Iowa. He was commissioned a first lieutenant in the U. S. Army, assigned to the Medical Corps. and served overseas with the 92nd Division and in the field hospital of the 368th Infantry. After his discharge Dr. Curtis returned to private practice. He was a surgeon and later became a Clinical Instructor at Howard University Medical School. Dr. Curtis died June 28, 1936 and is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Frederick Douglass Wilkinson was born in 1886 at Charleston, South Carolina, the son of James and Grace Wilkinson. His brother was Garnet C. Wilkinson, first assistant superintendent of the Colored Public Schools of the District of Columbia. Frederick Wilkinson attended public school in the District, and graduated from Dunbar High School. About 1910, he married Margaretta Ida Welborn and had three children: Doris, Grace and Frederick Wilkinson, Jr. By 1920, the family resided at 1902 – 11th Street, NW, but later made 1914 – 10th Street, NW, their permanent home. In 1920, Mr. Wilkinson became registrar at Howard University where he earned his LL.B. degree in 1924. He served in this office for thirty-five years, registered about 150,000 Howard students and was considered by some as the "dean" of American university registrars. Mr. Wilkinson

founded the National Association of Collegiate Deans and Registrars and trained numerous young men in the vocation. He took an active interest in getting foreign students admitted to American colleges and was an advisor to various foreign student associations. He also served on the scholarship committees of the Seafarers International Union, International Longshoremen's Union, and the International Brotherhood of Teamsters Union. In 1954, Mr. Wilkinson was cited for distinguished service by the Howard University General Alumni Association. In 1956, he was awarded Howard's Alumni Achievement Award for "outstanding postgraduate achievement in the field of education." In 1961, Mr. Wilkinson wrote a history of the engineering and architectural school during its 50th anniversary. Thereafter, he compiled the *Directory of Graduates, Howard University, 1870 - 1963*. Mr. Wilkinson died August 29, 1966 and is buried at National Harmony Memorial Park, Largo, Maryland.

John F. N. Wilkinson was born at Washington, D.C., in April 1878, the son of John and Rachael Wilkinson. He and co-founder Frederick D. Wilkinson were not related. John Wilkinson graduated from the old Manual Training School and later took courses in manual art at New York University and at the University of Pennsylvania. Later, he taught manual arts in the District's public schools from 1902 until his retirement in 1950. He married Prue Manning Cargill on April 3, 1929 and became step-father to Muriel Cargill. Their children were Prue and John Wilkinson III. Mr. Wilkinson was very active professionally, socially and athletically. For many years he was associated with several elementary school PTA organizations where he variously served as member, historian, treasurer or president. He was vice president of Southwest Civic Association, vice president of Capitol View Civic Association, member of the NAACP, and a member of the Committee Against Segregation and Discrimination. Mr. Wilkinson was a member of GUO of Odd Fellows for 35 years, charter member of the National Capitol Lodge No. 980, exalter ruler IBPOE of Washington, treasurer of the Past Exalted Rulers Council No. 4, IBPOE of Washington, and deputy of the District of Columbia J. Finley Wilson Appointee Club. Wilkinson was a member of the 12th Street YMCA and was organizer and life member of the Bachelor's club. He served two terms as president of Bachelor-Benedict. Mr. Wilkinson helped organize the National Tennis Association and won trophies in the singles, doubles, mixed doubles and veteran singles tournaments. He and Lucy Slowe, a noted educator and Dean at Howard University, were never defeated in mixed doubles. During his playing career, Wilkinson acquired more than 43 trophies. Among them being the Sportsman Trophy in a Chicago tournament. He organized the District's Public School Athletic League and served as Chairman of Divisions 10-13 games committee for 10 years. As an outstanding baseball player, he played with the Navy Yard in the Municipal Department League, Stonewalls, Washington Stars, Dale Athletics of Atlantic City, New Jersey; Rockville Athletic Club, Wilmington Giants of Delaware, and the Harrisburg (Pennsylvania) Giants. Mr. Wilkinson had a tryout with the Cuban Ex-Giants but did not play because of a strike by the Cubans. He served as umpire during a mixed off-season contest between the Washington Senators, labeled as the All-Stars, and the Brooklyn Giants. John Wilkinson died on June 24, 1952, at his residence, 5224 Ames Street, NE, and is interred at Lincoln Cemetery, Suitland, Maryland.

William H. Wilson was born in Washington D.C., in 1873. Educated locally, he later attended Spencerian Business College. He earned his medical degree at Howard University in 1907, at which time he resided in the city at 607 – 1st Street, SW.

Organization

Although from 1910 until 1911, no record of specific club activity has been found, much thought was directed toward the group's organizational aspects, because on August 22, 1911, the Bachelors Pleasure Club was incorporated. The cosigners, identified in the reproduced document on the following page, constituted a three-member board that was designated to manage the Club's affairs, and are identified as: Wilbert I. Stewart, Lawrence L. Tenly and Isaac Wright.

The Bachelors Pleasure Club Incorporation

Recorded August 22, 1911, 2-20 (12308)

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That we, the undersigned citizens of the United States, a majority of whom are residents of the District of Columbia, desiring to form a Club under sub chapter three (3) of the incorporation laws of the District of Columbia, as provided in the Code of Law of the District of Columbia enacted by congress and approved by the President of the United States, do hereby certify:

First. That the corporate name of this Club shall be the "THE BACHELORS PLEASURE CLUB," and the object for which it is formed is to maintain and manage a Club for the social intercourse, mutual enjoyment, improvement and recreation of its members and in general to do and perform every lawful act and thing necessary or expedient to be done or performed for the efficient and profitable conducting of said club as authorized by the law.

Second. The term of its existence shall be for Ninety nine years.

Third. The affairs of the said club for the first year shall be managed by a Board of Three directors, namely: Wilbert I. Stewart, Lawrence L. Tenly and Isaac Wright.

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter or change any provision contained in this certificate of incorporation in any manner prescribed by Statute, and all rights conferred on stockholders herein are granted subject to this reservation.

In Witness Whereof, we have hereunto set our hands and affixed our seals this 22nd day of August 1911.

Bachelor-Benedict Emerges



A Period of Inactivity

In spite of the prospects suggested by the 1911 incorporation of the Bachelor's Pleasure Club, a series of traumatic events apparently affected the Club's development. A tumultuous political and racial atmosphere prevailed before and after World War I (1917-1919). In 1913, President Woodrow Wilson replaced most of the blacks in federal offices and, during his two terms, his wide-spread policy of segregation throughout the government was devastating to black citizens. Even the Recorder of Deeds, which had been filled by a black man since 1881, was filled in 1916 by Wilson with a white replacement. Shortly thereafter, on April 6, 1917, the United States entered the war against Germany and six months later, on October 1918, the city virtually closed down when a "Spanish Influenza" epidemic resulted in over 25,000 cases with more than 1,500 deaths. The war armistice was declared on November 11, 1918 and, by January 1919, a program initiated by D.C. Commissioner Brownlow established an all-Negro platoon in the Fire Department that ensured promotions for the department's four colored veterans of twenty years' service this gave new black firemen "a chance to prove their competence under men of their own race." By July, however, thousands of returning black servicemen were met with violence as they flooded the employment market. In the first year after the war, more than 70 former soldiers were lynched, some in their military uniforms. These atrocities, called "The Red Summer" by some, led to race riots in 25 cities. Roving bands of white servicemen prowled the streets of Washington and beat up innocent blacks. By July 21, guns were being distributed to black veterans on the corner of 7th and T Streets, NW. Many people, both black and white, were killed or injured before order was restored by a combination of the unexpected nature and intensity of black resistance and imported federal troops.

Reorganizing and Changing the Name

Plans to rekindle the spark generated by the Bachelor's Club were underway early in 1919. In the intervening years many of the original members had married, yet wanted to retain their membership. Therefore, it was decided to add the word "Benedict," defined as a recently married man, to the Club's name to include those who were once confirmed bachelors. On November 4, 1919, the Bachelor's Club was reorganized as the Bachelor Benedict Club. At that time a black social club of the same name existed in New York City as well as a white group in Washington, D.C. These, however, failed to survive. Since then, the name reappears in clubs located in several cities across the nation. Identified today are two additional and unaffiliated Bachelor Benedict clubs. The first, established in 1933, survives at Norfolk Virginia; and the other, located at Charlestown, West Virginia, was founded in 1935.

On November 28, 1919, Bismark R. Pinchback was elected president of the rejuvenated Bachelor's group, and Fred Wilkinson was elected Secretary-Treasurer. The first Personnel Committee met at 519 Florida Avenue, NW, and consisted of Dr. W. H. Wilson, Mr. F. E. Parks, Dr. Arthur Curtis, Mr. Jay Clifford, Attorney G. E. C. Hayes, Fred Wilkinson and John Wilkinson.

The Personnel Committee immediately undertook the task of writing a Constitution for the Club and, over the next several months, generated a document founded on democratic principles with power vested in the Club's membership. Its wording assured that no officer nor any Personnel Committee could destroy the purpose for which the club was organized and that no clique could gain control. This carefully worded instrument was intended to address as many situations that were perceivable as that time, with the realization, however, that different interpretations would arise in the future due to a fast changing world. Nevertheless, this initial Constitution served as the backbone of the organization. This document, which has been appropriately adjusted to keep pace with the times, accounts in part for the Club's longevity.

Working Out the Wrinkles

Much information regarding these early years is provided from a surviving transcription of a meeting between John and Fred Wilkinson who contemplated presenting a skit on the Club on December 27, 1948. Although the skit never took place, these two founding members discussed various topics that resulted in the preservation of aspects that occurred in the Club's history between 1919 and 1948 that would otherwise be lost. For instance, according to original member John Wilkinson, the prime purpose in the minds of the founders was to establish a social club to entertain the members and visiting out-of-town guests during the holiday seasons. In order to receive an "admit card," visitors had to be invited by standing members, and no in-town man could attend a dance. The reason in-town men were excluded was to encourage Club membership, since it would be cheaper to come as a guest rather than as a member. Guest tickets had to be purchased during these founding years. Membership fees [during that period] went from \$20 to \$25 per season. There were four dances per year and tickets, at a cost of 6 for 25 cents, were sold for each event. Since few cars were available, most persons either walked or used street cars to get to the affair. Men were required to wear a full dress suit which, in case of need, could be rented for \$1.00. Generally, the ladies wore the same dress to all four dances and some wore them for years. The orchestra in those days consisted of a piano and drums. No man, not a member of the club, was permitted to attend the dances, and a single man who was not a member could only attend if he was a student at Howard University. Furthermore, newspaper sources indicate that students were restricted to one affair per season, and it was not until May 16, 1931, that a student could attend all four. John Wilkinson said it was very difficult to become a member of the Bachelor's Club. A candidate had to initiate his own application and almost approach each current member to assure a favorable vote. If

a member dropped out after being elected to the club, he was never permitted to be reinstated. There was much prestige associated with being a member of the Club. Fred Wilkinson reflected on “hiring” his first full dress suit to be appropriately attired for one of the dances. He said “the coat fitted fairly well, the trousers were too long so my mother stitched the legs up to fit me. I borrowed a shirt, collar and tie and for cuff links I used safety pins.”

John Wilkinson reflected on the many problems that arose as the Club developed during that period. In part, he says “We just can’t expose the confidential working of the various Personnel Committees thru the years, such as fist fights, persons who crashed our dances, Personnel members selling guest tickets at a higher rate, politics used to become president, the dropping from the Personnel Committee of certain members who displeased certain Presidents, the difficulties we have had with the manager of the Lincoln Colonnade, the selling of souvenir programs at the entrance to our dances as [if] you were going to a prize fight or wrestling match, the introduction of debutantes, women already married, charging \$10.00 to debutantes to be introduced, [and] the holding of meetings of the Personnel Committee when the President hadn’t called same.”

During this time the Club’s social activities were numerous but, as well, conveniently scheduled. Dances were held in the cooler months of the year to hopefully avoid heat and humidity, as well as periods when many members might be leaving the area for vacations. In 1931 the Club presented three debutantes to society, an activity that nine years later would develop into an annual event. As that decade neared an end, the first dance of the season was held on November 25, 1938, at the Lincoln Colonnade. Music was provided by Teddy Hill’s Orchestra, from New York City. Events that were scheduled for the 1939 season are listed in the following letter, written by Secretary-Treasurer A. L. DeMond.

Since the Bachelor’s Pleasure club no longer existed, it was necessary to incorporate under the new name. That document, a replica of which follows, was executed on June 5 and recorded on June 7, 1941. Apparently, Edward J. Edwards, Jr. was president at that time. The notary, Victor R. Daly, also was a member of Bachelor-Benedict.

The Club minimized its social calendar during the World War II period (1941-1945). Two previously planned events took place in 1941, which were The Annual Smoker, held at Crystal Caverns, December 22; and the Annual Christmas Dance, held at the Lincoln Colonnade. Several debutante presentations were also featured.

All of these events will be held at the Lincoln Colonnade. The Personnel Committee has voted that the Smoker will begin at 9:00 p.m. and the first dance will begin at 10:00 p.m. and end at 2:00 a.m. No person will be admitted to the dance after 12:30 p.m.

The Personnel Committee has also voted that the membership fee for the year 1939-40 shall be \$12.00 payable in full on or before November 3, 1939. All checks are to be made payable to the Bachelor-Benedict Club and mailed to the undersigned.

A few vacancies exist in the membership and if there are any of your friends who desire to apply, kindly have them submit their application to the undersigned in writing on or before November 5, 1939.

Black Pilots in World War II

In 1939, the Army Air Corps was expanded through the Civilian Pilot Training Act, which allowed for six black colleges to prepare black students for aviation service. During World War II, a number of bold and determined young men volunteered for military duty to become America's first black aviation cadets, in defiance of many people who viewed that segment of the population as lacking the intelligence, skill, courage and patriotism for such an undertaking. These volunteers emerged from every section of the country, with large numbers coming from New York City, Los Angeles, Chicago, Philadelphia and Detroit. No standards were lowered by the military during the evaluation process of these individuals.

Most of these men were college graduates or undergraduates, and others demonstrated their academic qualifications through comprehensive entrance examinations. Those who possessed the physical and mental qualifications were accepted as aviation cadets and were initially trained as single-engine pilots, later possibly becoming either twin-engine pilots, navigators or bombardiers. Others were trained in operations, meteorology, intelligence, engineering, medicine and other fields. Enlisted members, whose services ranked below commissioned officers or warrant officers, were trained to be: aircraft mechanics, armament specialists, radio repairmen, parachute riggers, control tower operators, policemen, administrative clerks, and in many other positions that were essential to support an Army Air Corp flying squadron.

The black pilots trained at Tuskegee Army Air Field (TAAF), in Tuskegee, Alabama. From 1941 through 1946, nine hundred and ninety-four pilots graduated at TAAF, receiving commissions and pilot wings. One of the initial graduates was Captain Benjamin O. Davis, Jr., who later became the first African American general in the United States Air Force. Black navigators, bombardiers and

“A high ranking general in the Pentagon demanded that Colonel B. O. Davis, Jr. serve three months in combat before taking command of the 332nd fighter Group, with the hope that Colonel Davis would not survive. The same general demanded that the 99th Squadron be returned to the United States in disgrace because of its poor showing the first three months in combat. He was overruled and the outfit was given another opportunity. Shortly thereafter, Anzio [5th Army beach landing in Italy] occurred and, with Major Roberts in command, the 99th pilots destroyed more enemy planes than any American or British Squadrons in the area, thus securing the future of Blacks in aviation.”

gunnery crews trained at selected military bases elsewhere in the United States. Four hundred and fifty of the pilots who trained at TAAF served overseas in either the 99th Pursuit Squadron (later the 99th Fighter Squadron) or the 332nd Fighter Group, which successfully escorted bombers on air combat missions over Europe. The 332nd conducted more than 200 bomber-escort missions and did not lose a single bomber to the enemy.

As pilots or as supporting personnel, the accomplishments of this outstanding group of black airmen far exceeded all perceived expectations. These patriotic Americans accepted the challenge to succeed. They proudly displayed their skill and determination while suppressing internal enmity caused by the humiliation and indignation of frequent experiences of racism and bigotry, at home and overseas.

Bachelor-Benedict Pilots

Several former members of Bachelor-Benedict trained and served as Tuskegee Airmen during and following World War II. Namely, they are: James A. Hurd, Hayden C. Johnson, Wilmore B. Leonard and John H. Williams. Although the details of their individual participation vary, their names are listed among those that will live forever in hallowed memory:

JAMES A. HURD was born August 20, 1917, at Ardmore, Oklahoma. When he was about 22 years old he joined the U. S. Army 10th Cavalry at Fort Riley, Kansas, where blacks were known as Buffalo Soldiers, a term dating to the Civil War. At Tuskegee Institute, where Mr. Hurd was a student, he convinced his reluctant ROTC commander to let him enter the training program. He became a member of class 44-H-TE and graduated the program with his aviation wings, as a 1st Lieutenant, on September 8, 1944. During his military career, Mr. Hurd received over a dozen awards and decorations and served in France, Germany, Korea and Japan, and attained the rank of Lt. Colonel. He earned a bachelor's degree from Tuskegee Institute and a master's degree from Howard University, where he was an administrator for over 20 years. He was a member of Sigma Pi Phi fraternity, Gamma Xi Boule and Omega Psi Phi fraternity. Mr. Hurd was a member of Bachelor-Benedict in 1975 and 1976. He died May 4, 1983, at the age of 82, at Sarasota, Florida.

HAYDEN C. JOHNSON was born April 2, 1908, at Washington, D.C. His father was a physician and the family resided at 2015 Vermont Avenue, NW, for many years. Hayden was educated locally and graduated from Dunbar High School, as did his older brother Maurice. Both attended Howard University where Maurice earned a degree in medicine, in 1926, and Hayden earned a degree in law, in 1930. Both were members of the ROTC. Maurice entered the Tuskegee flight training program and became the first black flight surgeon in the military. Upon Maurice's recommendation, Hayden was called to duty in June 1941 as a 2nd Lieutenant. Hayden subsequently commanded the ground forces of the 99th Fighter Squadron, from 1941 to 1943, in Africa and in Italy. He attained the rank of captain and earned several awards and decorations. His defiance to inequality was steadfast. He faced reprimands in several instances for complaining about old or inferior equipment, sending men into battle without sufficient training, and for refusing to segregate his men from their white colleagues on transports. Following his military career, Mr. Johnson practiced law in Washington, D.C. In 1987, he published *The Fighting 99th Air Squadron, 1941-1954*. He was a member of Bachelor-Benedict from 1950 to 1964.



WILMORE B. LEONARD was born about 1917, probably in Salisbury, Maryland. By 1930, he resided with his family at 307 Happy Alley, in that town. When he was about 24 years of age, Mr. Leonard entered the Tuskegee flight program and was assigned to class 44-H-SE. He earned his wings as a 2nd Lieutenant on September 6, 1942, and joined the 99th Squadron. No data are found regarding his service achievements, but he at least would have been awarded occupational medals. After his military service, Mr. Leonard earned degrees from Howard University and became a dental surgeon. He was a member of Bachelor-Benedict from 1964 to 1976.

JOHN H. WILLIAMS is listed on the rolls as a member of the 99th Air Squadron, however, no class number nor other military details about him were found. He may have served in one of the support units that were valuable to the success of the unit. He was a member of Bachelor-Benedict in 1950.

Debutante Presentations



European Tradition

Debutante, a word of French derivative that means “female beginner,” or a young woman making her debut into society, became popular in the United States in the mid eighteenth century. As with many of our customs, the roots of this tradition stem from England and the idea that a daughter of marriageable age needed to find a husband of suitable and similar social standing. Initiated in Philadelphia as “Dancing Assemblies,” the forerunner to the Debutante Ball, these affairs became very popular in the South with the introduction of many “Southern Belles” from wealthy and socially-influential families. Because of economic and class restrictions, these affairs originally involved only the white population. Time changes things and, by the twentieth century, numerous black citizens had moved forward financially as well as socially. Subsequently, it was not at all unusual to have a “coming out” for black debutantes. These debutantes of color represented young ladies from middle to upper class families who had reached the age of maturity and, as new adults, were making their debut into polite society. It is not surprising that Washington, D.C., emerged as a leader in this regard. Black parents in the District, which was among the first U.S. cities to develop a sizeable and cultured black middle class, were equally as proud of their daughters and as anxious to provide them with all of the positive benefits that were available to other Americans.

Establishing the Program

In 1931, perhaps as a prelude to the future, the Club presented three debutantes to Washington, D.C., society. Only Mary Martin MacRae has been identified as one of these ladies who, in 1985, said she was sponsored by Garnet C. Wilkinson. In those days the debutantes went to the affair with their parents and met their escorts at the dance. Afterwards, they went home with their parents. The Bachelor-Benedict Club is believed to be the first organization in this area to present black debutantes.



In the spring of 1940 Bachelor-Benedict Club held its first Debutante Presentation, which became an annual affair for the next thirty years. In order to reduce the cost to the individual families involved, the Club designed a system which made such affairs quite affordable. Each debutante was charged a nominal registration fee, but all other expenses of the affair were borne by the Club. This included renting the hall and providing musicians, choreographers and photographers, as well as furnishing printed programs. There was no fund-raising, nor were parents obligated to buy tickets or tables. It was required, however, that each debutante be sponsored by a member of the Bachelor-Benedicts. This led each year to considerable popularity of our members among the families of friends with prospective debutante daughters. The format for these cotillions was established by the late Major Arthur C. Newman, and his wife, Jennie, whose photo is inset. Major Newman was affiliated with the First Separate Battalion, the District’s all black National Guard unit. Jennie was the daughter of Solomon J. Johnson,

the first black clerk in the Treasury Department and a barber to President Abraham Lincoln. In later years the affair was coordinated by members of the Personnel Committee, one of whom would serve as chairman. Several members were remembered for their outstanding efforts as chairmen of the Debutante Presentations, including: S. Bruce Brown, Isaiah Burton, A. L. Gaskins, Frederick Phillips and Alphonso Williamson.

The programs were carefully staged with the resolve to assure pleasurable and lasting memories for the debutantes and their families. Many details regarding the elaborate and intricate nature of the affairs and the dedication to details is provided in a surviving 1948 program, which outlines the program: Introductory Statement (by the Chairman), Welcome (delivered by the Club's President or other representative), Grand Promenade of Debutantes, Sponsors and Escorts, The Formal Presentation (Each debutante bows and receives applause for twenty seconds), The Grand Review of the Assembly (A panorama view of the debutantes, flanked by their sponsors and escorts, with the membership of the Club in the background.), The Official Photograph of the Debutantes, Presentation of Prominent Citizens and Celebrities to the Debutantes, Debutante Waltz Time, and Dancing until 1 A.M.

In more traditional debutante presentations the debutante waltzes with her father; however, the Club developed the concept that this dance would involve the debutantes and their escorts. The need for choreographers was immediately apparent since the waltz was not usually part of the repertoire of most young people. Through the outstanding efforts of Claire Haywood, Doris Jones and Therrell Smith, choreographers through the years for the Bachelors, the Debutante Waltz became a thing of exquisite beauty. Debutantes and their escorts were frequently called upon to dance an utterly nontraditional encore. No doubt, to this day, there are former debutantes or their escorts who attribute their waltzing expertise to Bachelor-Benedict.

These affairs were held in many places, the names of which constitutes a listing of the public halls open to the black community of Washington through the years. Most of these venues have disappeared or survive under another name, such as: the Music Hall, Murray's Casino, the Lincoln Colonnade, the Masonic Temple, and Uline Arena. A number of hotels include the: Presidential Arms, Continental Hotel, Madison Arms, Willard Hotel, Statler-Hilton, Wardman Park, and Sonesta Hotel.

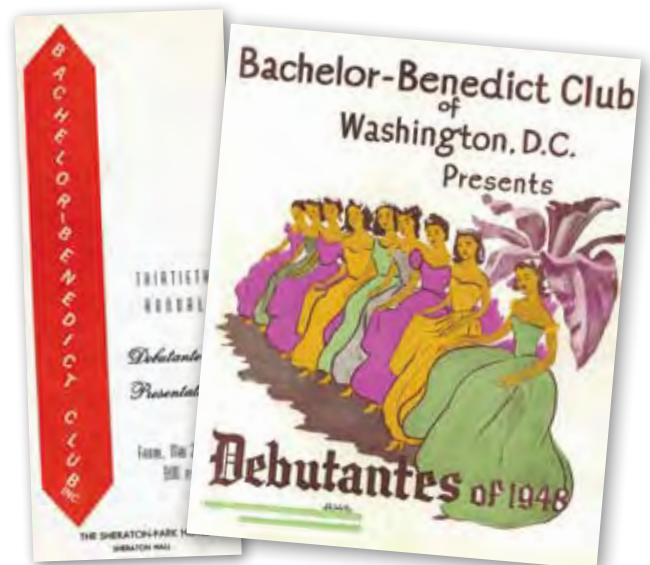
These presentations provided an important developmental link between youth and a well-adjusted maturity. However, changing attitudes among succeeding generations of young ladies caused interest to fade and resulted in the cancellation of this activity. The first presentation, held in 1940, presented 10 debutantes. By 1947 this number jumped to 81 and, in 1948, escalated to 125 young ladies. During the next two decades the numbers faded until only 22 are identified in 1968. On May 15, 1970, at Hotel Sonesta, the Bachelor-Benedict Club sponsored 19 young ladies for its Thirty-First Annual Debutante Presentation, which was its last.



Bachelor-Benedict's Debutantes

Following is an enumeration of the identified Bachelor-Benedict Debutantes who were presented by the Club from 1940-1970. Primarily, these names were obtained from extant programs, newspaper articles and several former debutantes. Missing are the names of those presented in 1942, 1943, 1944 and all but two in 1959. The list numbers 958 and is alphabetized by the debutante's maiden and given name, followed by the year of presentation:

Fifteen colored debutantes will be presented December 27 in the first party of its kind at the historic Willard Hotel.

Mrs. Jennie M. Walburg, of 2219 F street N.W., chairman of the committee planning the reception and dance, said in announcing the party:

"This activity is unique because it is the first, since integration, to be presented downtown in an outstanding, historical hotel, and it is being given with the hope of inspiring girls of our race to pattern their lives in such a manner that their parents would be warranted in presenting them."

Cites Commercialism.

Mrs. Walburg, a teacher at Lincoln Elementary School in Rockville, Md., and active in Negro organizations here and nationally, proposed the reception as an alternative to debutante parties which she said had become too commercial in recent years.

Her proposal, made last Labor Day, met with enthusiastic response, and a committee was formed to carry it through.

She said it seemed natural for the committee to select the Willard for the reception because of its place in Washington's history.

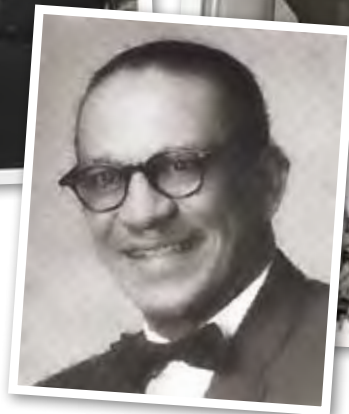

Formal Affairs



Ribbon of Distinction

Apparently, in the late 1940s, a red ribbon was chosen by the Club as a sign of unity and to promote solidarity between its members. Although not mandated by the Club's Constitution, this symbol was readily accepted. In a 1946 group photograph of 58 Club members in formal attire, only 6 are wearing ribbons. In a 1947 photo, there is hardly a member without one. When dressed in proper attire at all formal Club events, each member proudly wears his red ribbon slanting across his check, from the upper left to the lower right. Club policy dictates that the ribbon is inseparable from a member's formal attire at Club functions.

Lapel Buttons (Pins)

Initially, the prominently displayed red ribbon served as a distinctive symbol to identify Club members in formal attire; however, it was inappropriate for use at the Club's numerous casual affairs. In 1991, during the administration of Club President Burt S. Hall, Jr., member E. Cunningham Warner presented an idea for a lapel button for members to wear in lieu of red ribbons. For members, his design presented a one-inch round button with a red stripe running diagonally through a white background, with a "B" on each side of the stripe. For the member's lady, the button appeared of similar size but with a white stripe running diagonally through a red background. Although this innovative prospect was given serious consideration by the Personnel Committee, no decision was made on the matter at that time.



About 1995, Club President Cunningham C. Bryant suggested to Secretary Walter K. Robinson that he design a lapel pin for members to use at informal affairs. Brother Robinson's approach was similar to that of Brother Warner's; however, with several noteworthy exceptions. Displayed above, and in use today, the size and basic concept as in the 1991 version of the button were the same, but with several additions. The year the Club was founded appears in the upper left, and the Club's name is presented in circular fashion at the edge of the pin. In the lower portion, three red stars are displayed over three red horizontal bars. This aspect drew official, albeit temporary, concern from the District of Columbia whose flag is similar, but bearing only two red horizontal bars. The member's button has a post fastener. The lady's button, presently in disuse, was fastened with a clasp.

Banner

In 1991, member E. Cunningham Warner presented a Banner proposed to be displayed at Club Affairs. The design utilized a white background with a red diagonal stripe. In the upper left hand portion of the background were the words "Founded in 1910." A variation of this Banner remains in use today.

Club Seal

In 1991, at the suggestion of President Lovell L. Cyrus, the Club developed its own crest for use in the Obituary Pages upon the demise of one of our members. In use today, the design employs a black diagonal stripe through a white background with a "B" on each side of the stripe.

Expanding Through the Years

The social calendar of the Bachelor-Benedict Club began in earnest after its reorganization in 1919. Unfortunately, the Club's records dating from 1919 to 1931 have been lost or destroyed, and minimal information from sources such as newspapers, has surfaced. It is known, however, that several festive dances were held yearly by the Club and other like organizations. Reportedly, however, these affairs lacked the brilliance and lavishness of former years because the social atmosphere was geared toward the junior element of society. This trend changed drastically by the end of the 1930s. In fact, on December 26 of that year, the Bachelor's were in stiff competition with the Appomattox Club when each had their Christmas party on the same night. Since many of the smart set were invited to both parties, some of them attended both affairs. The Appomattox Club came out on top on this occasion, with the larger number of people dancing as their guests in the ballroom of the Masonic Temple. The Appomattox Club, however, faded into inactivity as the Bachelor's endured.

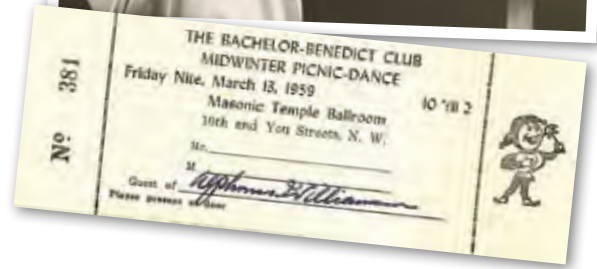
For about the next two decades, with limited access to buildings city-wide for black affairs, larger facilities and small clubs near Washington's "Black Broadway," served for Bachelor-Benedict's functions. Generally, this was the U Street corridor. The most popular in this area was the Lincoln Colonnade, which opened in 1922 and was located behind the Lincoln Theatre at 1215 U Street, NW. This was one of the most favored of Washington's

dance halls, which in the 1930s, '40s and '50s, was a whirl with the social life of Washington's black middle-class. The Colonnade was a dance hall with a tunnel entrance off U Street. Because of its size and convenient location, it could host all the big bands of the day. Most proms were held there and fraternities used it for parties. Small venues located in the vicinity of Black Broadway, and frequently utilized by the Bachelors, were Murray's Casino, Club Bali, Crystal Caverns and the Dunbar Hotel. After late night functions, a dawn breakfast was often enjoyed at the Bamboo Inn. As mentioned earlier, most of these once popular places disappeared many years ago.

The Bachelor-Benedict's social calendar moved forward with vigor, which, by the 1930s, included a smoker and four dances per year. On Friday evening, February 27, 1931, for instance, the Bachelor's held the third dance of the season at the Murray Casino. Only about two months later, on Saturday, April 18, the first dance of the new season was held at the same location with seventy-two people attending. At that time these were called Annual Banquets. At a stag affair, held on May 16 at the Whitelaw Hotel, the Club decided to change the venue for the four dances scheduled for the next year to the Masonic Temple. In 1941, an Annual Smoker held at Crystal Caverns, replaced the Annual Banquet. At this event new members were introduced. By 1959, the Annual Banquet became known as the Dinner Dance. During the next several decades the Club's membership increased significantly, and more space was required for throngs of people. In addition to those mentioned for the Debutante Presentations, dances were held at the National Airport Terrace Room, L'Enfant Plaza Hotel, Martin's Champagne Room, Baltimore; Bolling AFB Officer's Club, and the Shoreham Regency and Capital Hilton hotels. Today, the primary venue for the Bachelor's is Martin's Crosswinds, at Greenbelt, Maryland.





By 1985 the Bachelor's formal dances began to resemble those held today. A formal Cocktail-Dinner Dance is presented early in the new year. Attendance at this affair is limited to members and their ladies. This is the only "closed" affair presented during the social year. In every way a glamorous affair, the dance features a cocktail hour and a sit-down dinner. It is this dance that new officers, elected at the annual meeting, are introduced to members and their ladies. On this occasion new members, who were notified of their selection to membership, are inducted into the Club. At a short but moving ceremony their sponsors pin on their red ribbons. In the fall, generally in late October, another formal dance is held at one of the large hotels. At this dance, each member is assigned a table for ten to which he can invite four guest couples. More than a thousand persons regularly attend this affair.



Casual Get-Togethers



Midwinter Indoor Picnic

Throughout its history the Bachelor-Benedict Club has been quite innovative in planning and producing a variety of informal activities for the members. In years past, the Midwinter Indoor Picnic Dance always proved to be a fun-filled break from the horrendous weather outside. After spreading blankets on the floor, a good time was had by all as they ate chicken and potato salad. As recalled from the recollections of early members, these popular affairs took place at the Lincoln Colonnade, the Masonic Temple, and several of the Parish Halls in the Metropolitan Area. Remembered, and appreciated as well, were the efforts of the late Edward Jorgensen and his co-chairman Edward Perpall, who make these affairs successful. A combination of factors led to the demise of this eagerly attended get-together. One was a budget crunch, which stressed the Club's finances. The other was brought about by the advancing ages of many of the members whose older bones objected to bending for picnic seating. This affair was dropped in 1980 and was initially replaced by excursions to the Atlantic City Casinos.



Summer Outings

Past members also remembered midsummer outings when, in the 1950s, they would drive to a nearby farm, such as that of Dr. Webster Sewell, at Norbeck, Maryland, to a state park, or other area suitable for a picnic. A bus was provided for those members who did not wish to drive. Food was furnished by a caterer and the members would sing, dance and play cards. The Personnel Committee faced many problems when planning and completing the Summer Outing. The event was rained out on a few occasions and, when it was held, some of the ladies were less than enthusiastic about primitive toilet facilities. To the dismay of the Bachelors and their ladies, the caterer ran out of food one or two times and, on one occasion, he failed to show at all.

For a few years the summer event was held at the Washingtonian Country Club, where some of the members enjoyed swimming and golf along, along with a buffet meal. Recounted, as well, were the interminable lines for the buffet and having to go out of doors, even in the rain, to get beer from the keg. By May

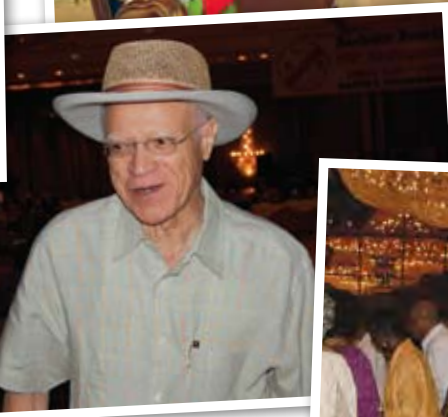




1960, the Arabian Room sufficed for this affair and, on March 18, 1978, an Indoor Picnic Dance was held at the St. Jude Ballroom.

This problem was solved since 1978 when the Summer Outing, by then called a Bull Roast, was held at Martin's Champagne Room, in Baltimore. By 1986, this well-attended affair moved to Martin's Crosswinds, at Greenbelt, Maryland, where it is still held. The affair is held on a Sunday afternoon in mid-July, and the Bachelors and their guests feast at a non-stop elaborate buffet for four hours. Featured are roast beef cuts, an extensive salad bar and soft drinks, with a bar also available.

A variety of other casual activities are also available to the members. In 2003 an Annual Golf Outing at Andrews AFB was initiated and continues to be a well-attended event. Even non golfers are known to attend the midday luncheon held after the last round. Today's excursions also include trips to Las Vegas and Dover Downs casinos.



The Administration



Constitution and By-Laws

The noteworthy journey of the Bachelor-Benedict Club from the early nineteenth century to the present has been guided by its sound Constitution and By-Laws. These documents govern the principles by which the Club operates and specifically addresses such things as membership, meetings, dues and assessments, the election and duties of Club officers, and much more. The Club is incorporated as a non-profit organization in the District of Columbia.

Membership

The number of individuals permitted as Bachelor-Benedict members at any one time is 141. This includes four Elected Officers: the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Archivist; 125 Active Members, those who have paid all financial obligations; six Honorary Members, those nominated by the Personnel Committee for longevity or outstanding service to the Club; and six Members Emeritus, those members who, after reaching age seventy-five and having been a member for twenty consecutive years, are elected to this status by the Personnel Committee. In order to assure flexibility in administrative philosophy and to provide for creativity and new ideas, each President is limited to no more than two consecutive terms in office. Other elected officers serve one year from the date of the Annual Meeting and may be reelected.

Personnel Committee

This committee consists of the Club's elected officers, together with six active members who are appointed by the President. Each new President must appoint at least one new member to the Personnel Committee. The Committee is charged with planning and executing all Club policies and programs and serves as the executive instrument in the interval between annual meetings. This group as well reviews and elects, by majority vote, individual applications for new membership or reinstatement into the Club.

Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the Bachelor-Benedict Club is held in the fall, generally after the completion of the social calendar. At this meeting officers are elected for the coming year, and business and procedural matters affecting the Club are discussed. Current officers report on the discharge of their responsibilities during the preceding year, and the Auditing committee verifies the financial status of the Club.

Honorary Members

The Constitution of the Bachelor-Benedict Club provides that certain members may be nominated for and elected to Honorary Membership in the Club. It is not an honor lightly granted. Only the following twenty-eight persons in the Club's one-hundred year history have been elevated to this status.

Past Presidents of The Bachelor-Benedict Club, Inc.

As mentioned earlier, from 1911 until 1919, the Bachelor's Pleasure Club was under the leadership of three directors: Wilbert I. Stewart, Lawrence L. Tenly and Isaac Wright.

Identified below are those members who served as presidents of the Bachelor-Benedict Club from 1919 to the present. These data were obtained from an analysis of extant programs, news clippings, personal information, and miscellaneous sources. Bracketed information is speculative.

The Club's president is elected for a one-year term. Within the listing, however, years are duplicated because an in-coming president is elected in the fall of each year and, therefore, serves a portion of the same year as his predecessor. In the Club's early years, there were no restrictions regarding successive terms, thus accounting for lengthy tenures in several instances. More recently, however, an individual is limited to two, one-year terms as president:

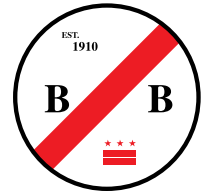

Academy Awards best director nominee (Precious) Lee Daniels has been signed by Columbia Pictures Producer Laura Ziskin to rewrite and direct "The Butler." The film will tell the story of Virginia native and longtime Washington, DC resident Eugene C. Allen, who served eight Presidents over a 34 year career. While Plessy vs Ferguson was still the law of the land, Allen began work as a White House Pantryman near the end of President Truman's Administration. He retired as the Maitre D' in 1986 under President Reagan.

Allen's story was first brought to life by acclaimed Washington Post feature writer and biographer, Wil Haygood in a front page story on November 7, 2008. As the Post reported Allen passed into history on March 31, 2010 at the age of 90. He was invited to attend the funeral of President Kennedy but declined to go so he could ready the White House for mourners after the services. When first lady Jacqueline Kennedy returned to the White House afterwards, she gave him one of the president's ties which he had framed as a cherished memento.

Allen and his beloved wife of 65 years Helene, planned to vote for Barack Obama on November 4, 2008 but she died on November 3rd. Helene who suffered from severe arthritis had previously stated that she didn't want an absentee ballot because this was one time she was gonna walk to the Polls! Mr. Allen had to make that walk alone.

At the end of his White House career Allen and Helene were invited to attend a State Dinner as guest by first lady Nancy Reagan. The ultimate highpoint was an invitation generously tendered by the Honorable Charles Rangel to attend the inauguration of the 44th President of the United States. Allen was heard to remark shortly afterward, "I guess I've seen it all!"

Mr. Allen is survived by his son, Brother Charles E. Allen of the **Bachelor- Benedict Club Inc.** and the President of the 101st Airborne Division Vietnam Veterans Association.
